A Little-Known Gem in Benzie County is Benzie Food Partners. Based in Honor, it is an independent charitable organization open to the public on the first and third Thursdays of every month. A totally volunteer-managed project, the group purchases food at wholesale prices from the Feeding America West Michigan Food Bank. It also receives regular and special bakery donations and seasonal products from other fresh food partnerships and generous local businesses. The Annual Empty Bowls Soup Nite is the Food Partners' main funding source after direct donations. For a donation, supporters can get a free bowl (made by Benzie Central students) to keep, a choice of one or more of the donated soup specialties, beverage, bread, salad, and dessert. They also receive assistance from the Crescent Bakery, Food Rescue and Family Fare, along with Sleeping Bear Farms and local residents. Their 2019 numbers are interesting. The food and other goods distributed, totaling 56,816 pounds, were obtained for less than 51 cents a pound. The average number of families served each month was 104, with a cumulative total of 3,005 residents served. Of those residents served, 802 were seniors and 742 were children. Our church supports this Little-Known Gem to the tune of \$100/month. That's about 12% of their expenditures for 2019. While we also support BACN, Benzie Food Partners (with their sole focus on food) is another place where families and individuals dealing with food insecurity can find help. Thank you all for helping to keep this gem shining!



In Celebration of Congregationalism in America (400 years ago)

The following is a brief history of The Mayflower passengers who arrived in Massachusetts on November 9, 1620 after leaving for its' trans-Atlantic voyage on September 6, 1620. The majority of them became the settlers of Plymouth Colony in Massachusetts. Of the passengers, 37 were members of a separatist Puritan congregation in Leiden, Holland (also known as Brownists) who were seeking religious freedom in the New World. The Mayflower launched with 102 passengers, 74 male and 28 female, and a crew headed by Master Christopher Jones. About half of the passengers died in the first winter. Many Americans can trace their ancestry back to one or more of these individuals who have become known as the "Pilgrim Fathers". Two dogs are known to have participated in settling in Plymouth. Edward Winslow writes that a female English Mastiff and a small English Springer Spaniel came ashore on the first explorations of Provincetown. (Continued on Page 6)






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The ship was probably also carrying small domestic animals such as goats, pigs, and chickens. Larger domestic animals came later, such as cows and sheep.

Forty-five of the 102 Mayflower passengers died in the winter of 1620-21, and The Mayflower colonists suffered greatly during their first winter in the New World from lack of shelter, scurvy, and the general conditions on board ship. They were buried on Cole's Hill Burial Ground in Plymouth, Massachusetts. In 1921, some of the remains of persons buried on that hill were collected into the sarcophagus that is the Pilgrim Memorial Tomb on Cole's Hill in Plymouth.
