

You know you've been through a pandemic when—

- You watch the virtual National Football League Draft—just for a change of pace.
- You get excited to see a person—in person.
- Gas is less than \$1.00 a gallon—and that's not the biggest news of the day.

It is no news that the major topics of discussion have been centered around Covid-19 and the economy. Those two aspects of life have held our attention, held us in their grip and maybe it's felt a little like being held prisoner.

For whatever goofy reason, when the stay-athome order came, and how folks were bristling against it, I thought about people in jail or prison. Take the justification of their plight off the table, and just look at their situation. Close quarters, freedom removed to do what they want, when they want, without the ability to get their affairs in order first. If nothing else, perhaps some of us can be a bit more patient with restricted movement, as well as having a little more appreciation for the incarcerated, regardless of rights or wrongs—or for those in countries more sequestered than ours.

According to quora.com, ""Fear not!" is the most repeated command in the Bible. In fact, it's been said that there are 365 "Fear nots" in the Bible — one "Fear not" for every day of the year! Lloyd Ogilvie in Facing the Future without Fear even said there are 366 "Fear nots" in the Bible, one for every day of the year, including Leap Year! God doesn't want us to go a single day without hearing his word of comfort: "Fear not!"

It's so easy to say "Don't be afraid." And we can understand that to a certain degree—on some level. But sometimes, even for no apparent reason, human nature invites fear to stick its toe in the door, and before we know it, we've gone down a hallway we had no intention of traveling, sometimes staying there for a lot longer than we wanted.

However, our human emotions and thoughts do not diminish God's promises. In the end, all will be well. We aren't told how we will get to that place of wellness—except that it will not include life as we have known it.

Even all the good things in life can take our attention away from the idea that our time on this earth is but a blink in the light of eternity. It is so very human that our attention can become unbalanced.

The greatest thing is that there is no shame or guilt or any other negative in remembering to recalibrate the balance of our lives, and God's love for us never changes, no matter what we do—or don't do.

So keep the mask at hand—for now. Keep distant from those you don't live with—for now. Do all those other things we're supposed to be doing to stay well in our current situation. And know that one day we won't have to work to keep our equilibrium, and that we will be able to do so much more than we can imagine today. Until that time, you can heed this naggy pastor's words—that you are—always have been—always will be—in the palm of God's hand. Hang in there, folks! We will be able to gather once again—sometime—hopefully soon.

FCCF Council Minutes-Via Zoom April 8, 2020

The Minutes from the March 11 Meeting were reviewed and with no corrections noted, were approved as presented.

Treasurer's Report: Rob Burch

Offerings for April totaled: \$19,221.74 Budgeted expenses for April totaled: 8,886.44 Carryover YTD: 3,077.24

The financial health of the Church remains strong thanks in part to substantial offerings in March. The Baird Fund has dropped due to the financial instability of late (see Investment Report totals). Following Rob's review, the Treasurer's Report was accepted as presented.

Committee Reports

Finance: Judy Welch—See Treasurer's Report

<u>Investment:</u> Andrea Frost – As of April 8, Stocks totaled: \$319,098.55; Bonds totaled \$265,917.92; the total in the Baird Investment Fund: \$585,016.62.

Constitution & By-Laws: Jim MacKenzie – No report

<u>Missions</u>: Paul Osborn—This account remains fully funded

<u>Outreach</u>: Kelly Ottinger—1) All anticipated or possible future activities have been put on hold during the Coronavirus shutdown. 2) Lines of communication will continue with an email program through Constant Contact, which allows for more professional and easily read emails.

Property: Myra Elias — No report with a meeting scheduled for Tuesday, April 14

Religious Education: Bill Hirschfeld – No report; however, Pastor Dinah did include the children on Palm Sunday by asking them to take pictures depicting Jesus' arrival into Jerusalem. She received several and showed them during the Palm Sunday Service.

Worship: Ann Osborn – 1) Pastor Dinah and FCCF have held three Facebook Live services since March 22, and each service has been viewed by more people each time.

2) A Maundy Thursday Service will be held on Facebook Live at 7:00 p.m., April 9. 3) A Good Friday Service will be held on Facebook Live at 12:00 noon on April 10. 4) The Easter Sunday Service will be on Facebook Live at 10:30 a.m. on April 12, with those wishing to participate in Communion doing so at home.

5) Pastor Dinah will continue to print a bulletin for Sunday services and email it for those that wish to follow scripture passages.

Pastor's Report: Dinah Haag – Report submitted, with a couple of items of note: 1) Until further notice, Worship Services will continue to be posted online through Facebook Live, with streaming the Services right to the web page also being explored at this time. 2) An attempt will be made to have smallish gatherings of individuals for virtual coffee or beverages, plus Pastor Dinah has begun the practice of calling to check in on 3 to 4 individuals each day during our time of social distancing.

Unfinished Business: A replacement for Kim Scripps on the Council is still needed.

New Business: Due to time sensitivity, it was decided by an emergency meeting of the Pastor, the Council's Chair, Vice-Chair and Treasurer that the Church, as it is eligible, should apply for a loan through the Paycheck Protection Program, part of the CARES Act. The forms were signed and taken to the State Savings Bank, who will then submit to the Small Business Administration. This will be a safety net depending on how long the Coronavirus Shutdown will be. We do not have to use the money (\$18,000) and can return if not needed.

No Report: Memorials, Nominating, Personnel, Religious Education, Women's Fellowship

Larry Neuhardt, Council Chair, called for meeting adjournment at 4:45 p.m.


