

Whooo-eeee! This past year-and-a-half has been a trip none of us could have anticipated in any way, shape or form. And some of us have had to learn things we never ever wanted. A fair bit was due to that covid thing, but that was along side regular life stuff.

There were moments that maybe made us a little proud—like when we didn't mention all the grey in so-and-so's hair, or the weight that what's-their-name gained. And maybe there were some moments of which we were less proud—like staying up way too late watching that next episode of whatever has captivated our attention at the moment. (Okay, not horrendous, but you get my drift. And not like I'd really know anything about that.)

The other day I was in the church kitchen, cleaning up the dehumidifiers with Katherine, and at the end of it, I went to wash my hands. As we re-enter into the world that was sort of like it was before Covid-19, we can determine what we will bring with us in our backpacks of faith. I hope you take this one with you! The Minutes of the April 14 Meeting were reviewed. With no corrections noted, the Minutes were accepted as presented.

Treasurer's Report: Rob Burch

Offerings for April totaled: \$8,506.00 Expenses for April totaled: 8,589.87 YTD Carryover: 13,134.34

Investment: Chris Porter – The total in all Baird Accounts is: \$876,682.58

Missions: Paul Osborn – This account remains fully funded.

<u>Outreach</u>: : Dinah Haag for Kelly Ottinger − 1) Graphs for virtual attendance at worship services were reviewed, which included how many and from where people visited our social media sites. 2) We are still on hold for any participation in the Frankfort 4th of July parade which has not been canceled as yet.

Property: Myra Elias – 1) The Church's upstairs bathroom cabinet was painted. 2) The sanctuary replacement storm windows are still on hold until late May or early June. 3) The power washing of the Church and the Parsonage's back deck will be done by the Nostrandt's soon. 4) The video/sound system parts are on backorder. 5) there is a remaining boiler issue. The installer is aware. 6) The lower exterior of the church needs

painting and volunteers are being sought. 7) Consumers Power will do an energy audit before we continue the solar panel possibility.

Worship: Ann Osborn – 1) Graphs for virtual attendance at worship services were reviewed. 2) Donations have been made, in conjunction with the Outreach Committee, to the Baby Pantry in honor of Mother's Day and Father's Day. 3) Pentecost Sunday will be celebrated on May 23. 4) The next Communion Sunday will be June 6.


